5th WINNER-conference

24 – 26 September 2024

Hybrid event, with physical components in the Netherlands

In WINNER - the *Week of Indonesia – Netherlands Education and Research* - you have the chance to interact with researchers, lecturers, practitioners, policymakers and the private sector. WINNER is a unique opportunity to deepen and expand your collaboration in the Indonesian-Dutch knowledge field and to share your knowledge, experience, and vision on the bilateral collaboration. In 2024, the physical components of the WINNER Conference will, for the first time, be organized in the Netherlands. The opening on 24 September will be hosted by the Dutch Ministry of Education, Culture and Science (OCW), and the closing on 26 September by the Embassy of the Republic of Indonesia (KBRI). This call for proposals is primarily for sessions to be scheduled in the programme on 25 September.

The theme for WINNER 2024 is "Nurturing Mutually Beneficial Cooperation in Higher Education and Research".

As in previous years, the conference theme encompasses a multitude of collaborations and questions, in fundamental and applied sciences, in natural, social, engineering, health sciences, and humanities. This conference is expected to intensify the conversation between academics, businesses, NGOs, and public organisations. WINNER continues to emphasise the need for inter – and transdisciplinary approaches and multi-stakeholder engagement in higher education and science in addressing various global challenges and achieving the SDGs. The internationalisation of higher education has made the education and research sectors into globalised, interconnected knowledge-based communities. Last year's WINNER conference looked at the value of knowledge relations and knowledge exchange opportunities for upscaling of collaboration to enhance intra-regional connectivity in both countries and beyond. Building on this, this conference aims to showcase the wide variety of collaborations between Indonesia and the Netherlands in higher education and research and their mutual values. What do we learn from each other in our cooperations? What impact does joint research and education between Indonesia and the Netherlands have on our societies? You can submit a session proposal this year on a wide range of topics of which more information is provided below (Annex 2).

This year marks the 5th edition of the WINNER week. It will be organised as a hybrid conference in which attendees are able to participate in onsite and online sessions and be inspired by existing and future collaborations. However, this year WINNER will invite Universities in the Netherlands to host streams of sessions on Day 2 of the conference. Session panellists in WINNER will thus have the opportunity to conduct their panel physically (with some panellists possibly still online) with a live audience. We have provided rooms in this form whether panellists are interested to host panels in a hybrid way (which could include inviting panellists from Indonesia to come to the Netherlands), or whether panellists prefer to conduct fully online panels.

To register your panel, please fill out the session registration form on the next pages and submit it to winner@nwo.nl before **May 2, 2024**.

The organising committee will then review all applications received and let you know as soon as possible whether we can give your session a place at the conference.

What you should know about the sessions

- The sessions will be hosted on the platform Ring Central (formerly known as HopIn).
- In the form you are requested to indicate whether you would like to organise your session in a hybrid format. If all session presenters can be physically together in one location (Netherlands or Indonesia) which allows to broadcast the session online, we may consider including your session as a hybrid session. In case you prefer to conduct your session online only, please select that option.
- The session should be jointly led by a presenter from a Dutch organisation and a presenter from an Indonesian organisation.
- Session leaders are responsible for organising the speakers, work forms, and content of the sessions.
- Please make the session broader than just the work of for example your own education or research group. Keep in mind that someone from a different disciplinary background, or from outside academia, should also be able to follow your session.
- If you submitted a session last year, you are very welcome to submit a session idea this year!
- The session should be interactive. If you need support for how to organise an interactive online session, you can email us at winner@nwo.nl
- The digital WINNER conference will allow for 4 hours of interactive live sessions per stream. We kindly request that you organize your session in such a way that it fits in a 75 minutes timeslot.
- If your session is suitable for recording and you don't have any objections against recording and later availability of the session on the WINNER website, please indicate this on the form.
- The programme for this hybrid edition will accommodate fewer sessions than a full 'live' conference. Consequently, the organising committee might have to exercise its right to select which session ideas can be accommodated in this edition of WINNER. The selection will be based on the following considerations:
 - A spread of topics and collaborations across the conference programme,
 - Interactivity of the session,
 - Alignment with the conference theme, and
 - Suitability for a wider audience.

You may be asked to combine your session with another session idea. The organizing committee will endeavour to communicate its feedback on your session idea before the end of May 2024.

If your session is selected, we will ask you to provide Nuffic Southeast Asia with a definitive title and description of your session, as well as the biographies and photos of the speakers for the website by June 10, 2024.

Annex 1: POSSIBLE WORK FORMS FOR INTERACTIVE SESSIONS

Please go to www.winner.or.id for more tips on how to organise an interactive online session. The suggestions below are examples of varying lengths. When adapting them for 75 minute sessions, keep in mind that listening attentively to a long presentation is more difficult for people attending online, so add interactive breaks between presentations or consider cutting a longer presentation into smaller segments and having discussion in between.

Masterclass – Presentation and interaction

In a masterclass, an expert from a knowledge institution, the government or industry provides an interactive insight into his or her expertise. A bold and daring speaker who we can learn from and above all is inspiring. The session is aimed at sharing knowledge and skills around a specific theme.

Possible structure: 10 minutes presentation + 5 minutes interaction + 10 minutes presentation + 25 minutes interaction, supporting visual material via for example Prezi or PowerPoint

Best Practice – Presentation and interaction

The 'Best Practice' offers a platform for a successful education and/or research collaboration/consortium setup/mix of knowledge development and questions from the field. Proposals could also be made to realise a better process or organisation of exchange, for example something that can be presented to the participants as a concept and then be discussed.

Possible structure: 5 minutes introduction and audience interaction + 15 minutes explanation + 25 minutes questions

Workshop – Collaboration

In the workshop, the participants will work together on an issue under the supervision of a moderator. In an open, honest and reciprocal manner they will jointly explore the issue and actively exchange ideas about possibilities to solve for example a scientific or societal problem. The workshop works best if a moderator keeps an eye on the process, time and the outcomes.

Possible structure: 10 minutes introduction + 25 minutes working in groups + 15 minutes presentation to each other and discussion, + 5 minutes concluding the session

Debate in a debating chamber – Discussion based on a proposition and 'camps of proponents and opponents'

In a debating chamber setup you can discuss various propositions with the participants.

Possible structure: 10 minutes introduction and the debate rules + 30 minutes debate + 5 minutes concluding the session

Annex 2: Examples of themes

#1 Energy

This sub-theme invites academics, researchers and practitioners to showcase their collaborative projects in various fields to address innovative knowledge and insights concerning national, regional, societal issues related to the technological, societal or governance challenges and government policy in (renewable) energy provision and just energy transitions. This can include proposals for sessions in relation to the follow-up of the Renewable Energy and Climate Summit Indonesia-the Netherlands, which took place from 9 to 12 October, 2023 in Jakarta, and potential collaborative projects to tackle the future implementation of green energy.

#2 Health

This sub-theme invites academics, researchers and practitioners to accelerate the understanding in the field of global health and planetary health. Within this, you are free to focus specifically on, for example: prevention, diagnostic innovation, treatment and care of infectious diseases, pandemic mitigation and recovery, non-communicable diseases, medical technology, mental health, sexual and reproductive health and rights, or more generic topics like capacity building in health or policy support.

#3 Agri / Food

This subtheme invites sessions around collaboration in the fields agriculture and food and nutrition security. There is a lot of collaboration between Indonesia and the Netherlands in aspects such as combatting malnutrition, promoting sustainable production of nutritious food and agricultural non-food products, driving agricultural transformations, and enhancing sustainability of value chains. At the same time, aspects like nature-inclusive agriculture and just and sustainable transformations, including social aspects, remain challenges for both countries. This stream invites sessions showcasing collaboration in the fields of agriculture and food security, or that facilitate discussions on mutual challenges and possibilities for mutual learning.

#4 Water

From wastewater treatment to coastal protection and from flooding to groundwater management, Indonesia and the Netherlands work together on many topics related to water. This stream gives room to sessions looking at cooperations and technological, societal or governance challenges around water, water management and maritime and marine topics.

#5 Human capital development

Human capital is an essential driver of economic development, underscoring the significance of continuous learning and skill acquisition in today's dynamic global economy (Becker, 1994). Consequently, development of human capital is essential to fostering sustainable economic growth and societal advancement. Through investments in education, capacity building, active labor market policies, gender equality, law, and inclusion, societies can enhance human capital, resulting in increased productivity, innovation, and overall well-being. By prioritizing human capital development, countries can not only improve their competitiveness but also foster more inclusive and equitable societies.

The current collaborations between Indonesia and the Netherlands represent an investment in both countries' human capital development. Collaboration in education and training between these two countries also plays a crucial role in promoting social inclusion because it brings together individuals from diverse backgrounds, cultures, and abilities. This enables individuals to learn from each other's experiences, perspectives, and strengths, thereby fostering understanding and empathy toward others.



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Submitting a session proposal to this theme, means focusing your session on interesting existing or potential collaborations between Indonesia and the Netherlands in which education, training and learning communities play a crucial role in promoting social inclusion and enabling individuals to learn from each other's experiences, perspectives, and strengths.
